Things Are Going Swimmingly

Swim Across America-Atlanta hosted the 10th Annual Open Water Swim at Lake Lanier Olympic Park. 528 swimmers, 50 volunteers and 14 Olympians gathered to celebrate a milestone anniversary of the Atlanta Swim raising more than \$356,000 for the Aflac Cancer and Blood Disorders Center. Established in 2013, Swim Across America-Atlanta has donated nearly \$2.8 million to the Aflac

Cancer and Blood Disorders Center to fund crucial research. More than 10 Aflac Cancer and Blood Disorders Center faculty and staff participated in the event and helped steward our Swim Across America partnership.



Ring, Ring, Ring That Bell

Hosted by Jenn Hobby Rivera and Grant Rivera, the third annual Ring the Bell Benefit took place on September 21st in Marietta. Pediatric cancer is a personal fight for Jenn and Grant as their 7-year-old daughter, Reese, beat cancer at 16 months old. The Ring the Bell Benefit was created in hopes of every child having the opportunity to ring the bell signifying the end of their treatment. This year, the event raised \$83,000 to benefit solid tumor research at the Aflac Cancer and Blood Disorders Center and Reese's MaGIC Fund, which supports the work of Reese's oncologist, Dr. Olson, and his germ cell tumor research. Since its inception, the family's efforts have raised over \$340,000 for pediatric cancer research.





30,000,000 Thank Yous!

The 22nd annual 95.5 WSB Care-a-Thon took place on July 28-29 and **raised a record breaking \$1,830,493** for research, the Fellowship Program and the family support team at the Aflac Cancer and Blood Disorders Center. The 37-hour event included interviews with faculty, staff, and more than 20 patient families and survivors. We are so proud of our partnership with WSB, which has raised more than \$30 million in the 22 years of hosting the WSB Care-a-Thon.

Hyundai Awards



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Coming To You Live

Sickle cell anemia is the most severe form of sickle cell disease, a red blood cell disorder that primarily affects Black and African American individuals. It's estimated that sickle cell disease affects approximately 100,000 Americans. Many people with sickle cell anemia report barriers to receiving the recommended screening and treatment. Dr. Amy Tang, pediatric hematologist at the Aflac Cancer and Blood Disorders Center, spoke with 11Alive about current barriers to care, including a lack of hematologists.
